

# Cascade Azalea



Cascade Azalea is smothered in stunning clusters of lightly-scented white trumpet-shaped flowers with a chartreuse blotch at the ends of the branches in mid spring before the leaves. It has dark green foliage throughout the season. The narrow leaves do not develop any appreciable fall color. The fruit is not ornamentally significant.



Reaches 5 feet tall; 6 feet wide.



Partial shade to partial sun



Water deeply, regularly during the first growing season to establish an extensive root system; once established, maintain evenly moist soil.



- Do apply annual, acidic based fertilizer. As a member of the ericaceous family, rhododendron/azalea require a lower soil *ph* level.
- Do provide adequate drainage and avoid “clay bowls” that are notorious for holding water and predisposing plants to the compost heap.



- Don't plant in exposed sites. Best growth occurs with protection from hot afternoon sun and drying winter winds.
- Don't allow to dry out; an evenly moist root system will be quickest to establish a juvenile plant and maintain stalwarts.
