Weeping Yoshino Cherry Tree



Fragrant, white-pink flowers; oriental branching pattern; glossy bark; dark-green leaves. A weeping version of one of the biggest stars of Washington, D.C.'s annual Cherry Blossom Festival, this flowering tree may be even more elegant than the original Yoshino. In time it forms a grand domeshaped canopy, and kids as well as the young-at-heart will want to step inside the magical space underneath its branches.

Reaches 40-50 feet tall; 25-40 feet wide.



Full Sun



Low trickle base to the root zone every other day for the first 2 weeks. Weaning to every 3rd week 1x per month; supplementing during times of drought.



- Do provide organic matter when backfilling rootball, adequate mulch layer and protection from hot afternoon sun.
- Do use sharp, clean tools when pruning; ragged stems and branches from dull tools leaves your plants open to various pest and disease.



- Don't plant too deep; pay attention to the root flare in relation to the surrounding grade. A tree too high or deep will result in a tree under stress.
- Don't neglect to thin the interior over time; as a member of the rose family, cherry thrives with good air circulation to interior structure.
