

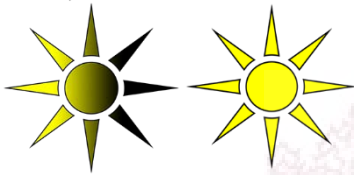
# Canadian Hemlock



A favorite for privacy screens and hedges because of its handsome, graceful appearance and ability to be sheared to any height or shape. The tree is also one of only few evergreens that can handle full sun and full shade, though it prefers a site where it can receive both shade and sun



Moderate growing; reaches 40 feet tall, 25 feet wide; larger with age.



Partial to full sun



Water regularly - weekly, or more often in extreme heat.



- Do use in hedge or screen as it responds well to heavy pruning/shearing.
- Do use sharp, clean tools when pruning; ragged stems and foliage from dull tools leaves your plants open to various pest and disease.
- Don't allow to dry out in full sunlight. This will result in sun scorch (drought injury).
- Don't fail to water regularly; this native Michigan plant is typically found at or near water.

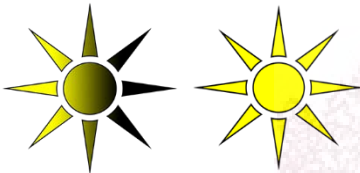
# Hatfield Yew



Upright yew foundation and hedge shrub is ideal for foundation plantings, hedges or planting along fences and walls. Broad, pyramidal shape with dark-green foliage retains its color throughout the winter. Adapts well to a range of well-drained soils, making it easy to grow in a variety of landscapes



Reaches 8-15 feet tall; 5-10 feet wide.



Partial to full sun



Water regularly - weekly, or more often in extreme heat.



- Do use sharp, clean tools when pruning; ragged stems and foliage from dull tools leaves your plants open to various pest and disease.
- Do provide adequate drainage and avoid “clay bowls” that are notorious for holding water and predisposing plants to the compost heap.
- Don’t forget to provide antitranspirant/antidesiccant in late fall. This is especially important to new plantings or exposed sites.
- Don’t fertilize or prune too late in the season; we want new growth to harden off before the season first frost.
