

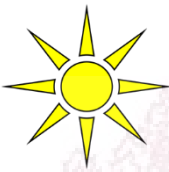
Little Lime Hydrangea



Little Lime hydrangea is small enough to grow in containers and also stands out as a bold mass planting. Its bright bloom coloration makes it an excellent choice for cut flower gardens and can be used fresh or dried. This reliable performer blooms on new wood, so a quick trim in late winter or early spring will encourage fresh growth and an abundance of buds. Summer flowers open soft green and turn pink and burgundy in fall.



Reaches 3-5 feet tall and wide.



Partial Sun to Full Sun



Requires regular watering.



- Do prune regularly; this will result in a much sturdier framework, capable of holding up the massive flower heads.
- Do prune in late fall or winter. This will avoid cutting off next season's blooms before they've had a chance.
- Don't forget to provide adequate drainage and avoid "clay bowls" that are notorious for holding water and predisposing plants to the compost heap.
- Don't prune plants too early or you run the risk of cutting off future blooms.
