Rainbow Pillar Serviceberry



A spectrum of color from spring to fall. Butterflies are drawn to the plethora of white, nectar-rich blooms in spring. The flowers yield deep-purple fruits that are enjoyed by birds and wildlife. In fall, the leaves change to brilliant shades of yellow to red. An attractive small specimen tree, hedge or screen.



Fast growing; reaches 10-20 feet tall; 10-15 feet wide.



Partial to Full Sun



Water your tree frequently soon after planting and during the first few years of growth. Twice a week will do during the first 6 months. Thereafter, you can water biweekly.





- Do provide organic matter when backfilling rootball, adequate mulch layer and protection from hot afternoon sun.
- Do use sharp, clean tools when pruning; ragged stems and branches from dull tools leaves your plants open to various pest and disease.
- Don't plant in an exposed site; this Michigan native is typically found as an understory plant, protected from high winds and harsh sunlight.
- Don't neglect to thin the interior over time; as a member of the rose family, serviceberry thrives with good air circulation to interior structure.
