## **Spring Flurry Serviceberry**



Attractive upright-oval form. In early spring, you'll look forward to its pretty, lacy white blossoms, which indicate that winter is behind us and warmer days lie ahead. In summer, you'll smile as the songbirds swoop in to nab its juicy purple fruits. In fall, you'll gaze at the warm red-orange glow of its autumn foliage. And in winter, with its limbs laid bare, you'll appreciate its smooth gray bark.



Reaches 30 feet high; 20 feet wide.



Partial Sun to Shade



Water your tree frequently soon after planting and during the first few years of growth. Twice a week will do during the first 6 months. Thereafter, you can water biweekly.



- Do provide organic matter when backfilling rootball, adequate mulch layer and protection from hot afternoon sun.
- Do use sharp, clean tools when pruning; ragged stems and branches from dull tools leaves your plants open to various pest and disease.



- Don't plant in an exposed site; this Michigan native is typically found as an understory plant, protected from high winds and harsh sunlight.
- Don't neglect to thin the interior over time; as a member of the rose family, serviceberry thrives with good air circulation to interior structure.



## **Cumulus Serviceberry**



This heavy blooming Allegheny serviceberry has a narrower upright-oval form than average. 'Cumulus' is an exceptional small tree admired for its beautiful early white spring flowers, outstanding orange-red fall color, and striking gray bark make it a lovely specimen for any landscape. The edible purplish-black fruit in late summer is attractive to many birds.



Reaches 20 feet tall and 15 feet wide.

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
## **Autumn Brilliance Serviceberry**



Bursting with white flowers in the spring time, this small tree will fit into any sized landscape. It is grown either in a single stem tree or a multiple stemmed large shrub which is suitable for accent planting or privacy screening. The oval shaped leaves emerge coppery-red, becoming rich green throughout the growing season. Produces sweet purplish-black fruit which is promptly taken by the birds. The fall color is dramatic and outstanding! The bark is smooth and light gray.



Reaches 15-25 feet high and wide.



Full Sun to Partial Shade
